### **Burying the** Alleluia

On Sunday, March 2nd, the Last Sunday after the Epiphany, our children will make "Alleluia" signs, and we will bury them for Lent. The idea of "burying the Alleluia" dates to

it means praise Yahweh or praise God. It is a term of great joy, an expression of worship or rejoicing. During the season of Lent, the declaration of "Alleluia" is omitted from all liturgies, all hymns and psalms and does not reemerge until the

the thirteenth century. Alleluia comes to us from the Hebrew word Hallelujah, and Easter Vigil or Easter Sunday Morning, when the resurrection is proclaimed. The association of Alleluia with Easter led to this custom of intentionally omitting it from the liturgy during the season of Lent as a verbal fast which has the effect of creating a sense of anticipation and even greater joy when the familiar word of praise returns. We let it rest during Lent so that when it reappears on Easter, we may hear it anew.

In fact, once it returns on Easter, we give it no rest at all, repeating it again and again, in celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus. "Burying the Alleluia" is a symbolic gesture at the beginning of Lent marking the solemnity of the season about to begin.

The Episcopal Church does a wonderful job of marking the seasons with the change in the color, changes in the liturgy, and in the hymns, and the season of Lent is no exception. One of the things I love about the Episcopal Church is the way we use our space and our liturgy to remind us that it is Lent. On the Last Sunday after the Epiphany, our color will be white. On Ash Wednesday the color will change to purple and remain purple throughout Lent until Holy Week, when it will change to red. We will not have any altar flowers during Lent. Things will look and feel much more simple. It will also sound different as we include the Great Litany on the First Sunday of Lent. The rest of Lent we will include the Penitential Order. We will use Rite I during

Lent as well. The liturgy will have some differences to it, there will be more solemn. quiet, contemplative music. A new Church of the Ridge tradition our children love, the fist bumps, will also be buried along with the Alleluias and not return until the Easter Vigil. The space, the hymns, and the liturgy will all remind us that it is Lent, a time for quiet reflection, a time for confession, a time for sacrifice, a time to remember we are but dust and to dust we shall return.

These things we do as part of our worship, if we really focus on them and invest ourselves in them, it only makes the arrival of Easter and the restoration of so many wonderful things that we miss during Lent that much more joyous.

Shrove Tuesday is the day before Ash Wednesday, marking the start of Lent, a 40-day period of fasting and reflection

leading up to Easter. The word "shrove" comes from the term "to shrive," meaning to confess and absolve sins1. Historically, Christians would go to confession on this day to prepare their hearts for Lent.

The tradition of eating pancakes on Shrove Tuesday dates back to the Middle Ages. During this time, it was customary to use up rich foods like eggs, milk, and butter before the Lenten fast, which prohibited such indulgences3. Pancakes became a popular way to use up these ingredients.

In many Christian countries, Shrove Tuesday is celebrated with feasts and festivities. In the UK, pancake races are a popular tradition, where participants race while flipping pancakes in frying pans4. The most famous pancake race takes place in Olney, Buckinghamshire, and has been held since 1445.

Shrove Tuesday is known by different names in various cultures. In French-influenced regions, it's called Mardi Gras, meaning "Fat Tuesday," reflect-

ing the practice of indulging in rich foods before the fasting period1. In the United States, Mardi Gras is particularly famous in New Orleans, where it has evolved into a vibrant and flamboyant celebration.

Today, Shrove Tuesday is still celebrated with pancake suppers, church services, and community events. It's a time for people to come together, enjoy delicious food, and prepare spiritually for the Lenten season.

### A little town History From Trenton, SC

The small town of Trenton South Carolina is the home of the Ridge Peach Festival. Thousands come from all over to celebrate for the event.

"Truly there's no place like Trenton. When you drive down this street on Peach Festival Day and those flags are waving and you get to the park and there's so much energy there," said Shari Huiet of Trenton Community Development Association.

If you're passing through Trenton you should take a look around because it's a small town with a whole lot of history. The town square alone has a piece of Trenton's history in every corner. There you'll find a mural showing how the town once was.

"Myself, and several people, and the mayor, got some pictures together and we talked to Beth Clark who's who's a very good artist and she came down and looked and gave us a price and did it for us. It's done in three, six, nine sections. Our little town use to be very big and have a lot of stores, three grocery stores at one time," said Clerk Treasurer, Sandra Grandy.

Just a few steps away from the mural is the old bank which is the future site of the towns museum.

Inside is you'll find a whole lot of Trenton's History.

"Most anything you want to see that's from the country. Everything in here belongs to somebody, doesn't anything belong to the town. They've got a piece a paper stating come get it, any time they want it," said Mayor Billy Padgett.

"This is how they use to put the mail in," explained Padgett. "These are old books from the past one of each year from the past," said Padgett.

For Trenton preserving it's history is important. Not only for themselves but for future generations to come.

"You know a lot of people don't know anything, about anything old and this is a way you can come in, maybe bring a school group in and see how the old stuff use to be," said Padgett.
